# A RESOLUTION REGARDING TITLE VI AND ADOPTION OF A TITLE VI POLICY STATEMENT

WHEREAS, the Centralina Council of Governments (Centralina COG) is the state-designated lead regional organization for the nine-county region in and around Charlotte, North Carolina; and

**WHEREAS,** Centralina COG's role is to coordinate the efforts of federal, state and local governments and organizations to grow our region's economy and jobs, control the cost of government and improve quality of life; and

WHEREAS, to fund its many program activities and initiatives, Centralina COG receives direct or pass-through federal funding from agencies such as the US Department of Transportation (Federal Highway Administration and Federal Transit Administration); the US Department of Health and Human Services; and the US Department of Labor; and

**WHEREAS,** Centralina COG, as a recipient and sub-recipient of federal funding will ensure full compliance with Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 which prohibits discrimination based on race, color and national origin, specifically 42 USC 2000d, which states that:

No person in the United States shall, on the ground of race, color, or national origin, be excluded from participation in, be denied the benefits of, or be subjected to discrimination under any program or activity receiving Federal financial assistance; and

**WHEREAS**, Centralina COG will also comply with the Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, as amended and its related statutes, regulations and all additional protections set forth; and

**WHEREAS**, Centralina COG has developed a Title VI Policy Statement that will direct the administration and implementation of the Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 within the organization and authorizes Centralina COG's Executive Director to further develop and provide any other Title VI assurances, plans and programs, as required.

**NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED,** that Centralina COG certifies that it will comply with the provisions of the Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 (as amended) and the associated responsibilities of the law and adopts the 2018 Title VI Policy Statement.

#### Call to Order

Chairman Bill Feather, Town of Granite Quarry, called the meeting to order.

#### Amendments to the Agenda

There were no amendments to the agenda.

Mayor Pro Tem Martha Sue Hall, City of Albemarle, made a motion to adopt the agenda as presented. Commissioner Ronnie Worley, Gaston County, seconded the motion and it carried unanimously.

## **Consent Agenda**

## 1. Approval of the May 9, 2018 Board of Delegates Meeting Minutes

Mayor Pro Tem Hall made a motion to approve the Consent Agenda. Commissioner Bill Lawhon, Stanly County, seconded the motion and it carried unanimously.

## 2. Board Engagement Activity Report Out

The Delegates reported on challenges their communities are experiencing related to quality of life, jobs and the economy, and the effectiveness of government, as well as ideal next steps to solve those challenges.

## 3. CCOG 50th Anniversary Panel Discussion

David Hollars, Centralina Workforce Development Board Executive Director, introduced panelists Lynne Hair, Planning and Zoning Administrator for the Town of Stallings and Thurman Houston, Mayor Pro Tem of the Town of Mooresville. Ms. Hair gave an overview of the comprehensive land use plan CCOG assisted the town in developing. Mayor Pro Tem Houston gave an overview of the aging sensitivity training CCOG conducted for Mooresville staff. He also discussed the downtown walkability audit CCOG conducted for the town.

In response to questions from Mr. Hollars about the walkability audit's benefits to the community, Mayor Pro Tem Houston explained that the audit helped enhance Mooresville's downtown area, adding that the town wants to be proactive in engaging millennials as well as seniors. He noted that the town considered working with a consultant on the project but chose to use CCOG's services because of a good working relationship with the organization.

In response to questions from Mr. Hollars about the comprehensive land use plan's benefits to the community, Ms. Hair explained that the plan development process helped Stallings identify several areas in the community that could benefit from further planning, which led to the creation of small area plans. She noted that these planning documents have been used as an economic development tool and added that the comprehensive land use plan can attract developers and guide mixed-use development. She also noted that there was some pushback from the Town Council, but it was ultimately supportive of the plan because it saw the need for increasing density so the town could better support itself from a tax base standpoint.

In response to questions from Mr. Hollars about the aging sensitivity training, Mayor Pro Tem Houston explained that the town's public works, human resources, and fire departments participated in the training. He noted that the sessions helped educated town staff on what to be aware of when communicating with seniors. He added that both the walkability audit and the aging sensitivity training brought new ideas to everyday issues.

Vice Chair Bobby Compton, Town of Mooresville, noted that the Mooresville and Stallings projects were examples of the services CCOG provides to its member governments and examples of how other communities are addressing issues.

#### 4. Regional Transit Panel Discussion

Michelle Nance, Planning Director, introduced panelists John Muth, Deputy Director of the Charlotte Area Transit System (CATS), Scott Neisler, Mayor of the City of Kings Mountain, and Mark Cramer, Executive Director of the Greater Gaston Development Corporation.

In response to questions from Ms. Nance and Commissioner Martin Oakes, Lincoln County, about extending light rail line into Gaston County, Mr. Cramer explained that funding for the project will need to come from a variety of sources at the federal, state, and local levels. He added that Gaston County needs more access to Mecklenburg County and Charlotte and those locations, along with Charlotte Douglas International Airport (CLT), need more access to Gaston County. Building a new bridge across the Catawba River will help increase that access.

In response to Ms. Nance's question about commuter rail from Kings Mountain to Charlotte, Mayor Neisler suggested using existing assets such as the Norfolk Southern rail line. He noted that a study will be completed in November that will identify potential infrastructure improvements for this line. He also noted that a park and ride lot could be located in Kings Mountain. He gave an overview of other project components such as developing ridership estimates and operating costs, identifying rail vehicle needs and station locations, and coordinating with state and local officials. He also gave an overview of challenges such as state legislation for commuter service, negotiation with Norfolk Southern, and capital costs of infrastructure.

In response to Ms. Nance's question about the Lynx Blue Line expansion plan, Mr. Muth explained that planning to bring the light rail into Gaston County has occurred because any planning for building a new bridge across the Catawba River needs to accommodate future light rail. He added that the expansion could elevate the project to a regional tier in the Strategic Transportation Investments funding process and going forward, there will be a bigger vision for planning and working across county lines. He also noted that CATS recently applied for a grant that will help in discussing planning and land use practices along the light rail corridor. He added that the recent Regional Transit Summit and ongoing work are the catalyst to take regional transit to the next step.

In response to Ms. Nance's question about the Charlotte Airport Connected Economic Strategy, Mr. Cramer noted that it is imperative to engage the business community, planners, and elected officials to generate long-term support needed to fund a transit plan. He noted that CLT extended its airport area development plan into Gaston County to further examine airport connected economic development opportunities in the area surrounding the facility. He presented an overview of the plan development process. He encouraged other communities to consider how they relate to CLT and how they can build on the economic analysis the airport has already done.

Ms. Nance summarized the key themes of the panel discussion as engaging the business community and the public, working together and across county lines, and looking ahead to the future while also thinking about short-term projects that can move the regional transit effort forward.

### **CCOG Conference and Executive Director Search Updates**

Chairman Feather recognized Commissioner Oakes for updates on the 2019 CCOG Conference and the Executive Director search.

Commissioner Oakes encouraged the Delegates to take copies of the Conference save-the-date to share with others in their communities. He noted that planning staff can obtain continuing education credits by attending the March 8 event. He reported that CCOG has secured Peter Kageyama as a keynote speaker and to lead a pre-conference workshop at the CCOG office on March 7.

Commissioner Oakes also reported that the search for the next Executive Director is underway. Mayor Pro Tem Hall and Council Member Michael Johnson, City of Statesville, have joined the search committee. He noted that at least a dozen applications have been submitted so far. The committee will review submissions after the August 17 application deadline.

#### 5. August Advocacy Update

Leslie Mozingo, Strategics Consulting, explained that last year, CCOG began increasing its advocacy efforts by scheduling local meetings with members of Congress to give Delegates an opportunity to speak about CCOG's priorities. She noted the importance of elected official-to-elected official contact.

Chairman Feather noted that he attended a meeting with Representative Ted Budd in which they discussed local issues. He described how Representative Budd successfully advocated for Granite Quarry to have its own address instead of a Salisbury address. He added that congressional representatives are receptive to listening about local issues and encouraged Delegates to sign up to attend the advocacy meetings.

Commissioner Compton added that meeting locally with members of Congress has been relaxed and informal and has provided an opportunity to discuss local and regional issues. He noted that it has been easier to meet with Representative Budd locally than in Washington, D.C.

Ms. Mozingo explained that she will contact the Delegates who have signed up to attend the advocacy meetings, adding that they will be invited to participate in conference calls to prepare for the meetings.

Chairman Feather suggested taking photos during the advocacy meetings.

### **Comments from the Chair**

Chairman Feather reported that local governments are asked to submit nominations for CCOG's Region of Excellence Awards in the categories of Growing the Economy, Controlling the Cost of Government, Improving Quality of Life, Clean Cities, Aging in Action, and Excellence in Government Leadership. The submission deadline is October 1. Award recipients will be honored at the Region of Excellence Awards luncheon at the Speedway Club at Charlotte Motor Speedway on Friday, November 30.

He also encouraged the Delegates to save the date for the next Board of Delegates meeting, which will be held on Wednesday, October 10 in the Laureate Center at Kannapolis City Hall.

#### **Comments from the Board of Delegates**

There were no comments from the Board of Delegates.

## **Comments from the Interim Executive Director**

Jim Prosser, Interim Executive Director, thanked the Board for giving him the opportunity to return and continue the work of CCOG. He added that the Delegates' work is important to their communities and to future generations. He encouraged the Delegates to consider CCOG for projects in their communities that may require consultant services. He noted that CCOG's public engagement process can help in managing political risk and making informed decisions.

With no further business to be discussed, Chairman Feather adjourned the meeting at 8:24 p.m.

The Board is being asked to open meeting up for a Public Hearing to fulfill the FY20 North Carolina Department of Transportation (NCDOT) grant application requirements and provide an opportunity for any citizens to voice opinions regarding the Mobility Management. The Board is also being asked to approve a resolution of support for applications for NCDOT funding that would support continued funding for mobility management efforts.

## **Description of Agenda Item:**

NCDOT has issued a call for applications for FY20. Applications are due November 2, 2018. Centralina CCOG seeks to apply for continued funding for the Centralina mobility management activities.

## **Background & Basis of Recommendations:**

In 2011-2013, Centralina developed regional strategies based on expressed local needs related to the rapidly aging population, decreased transit funding, and increased need for coordination between transportation agencies. NCDOT funded the implementation of initial strategies outlined in the mobility plan. These strategies included creating a mobility management program for training, outreach, and coordination. These programs are in need of continued funding through FY20.

## **Action / Recommendation:**

Motion to approve the attached resolution, which notes that Centralina CCOG will apply for funds, that the Executive Director is authorized to sign the application, and that the Board supports funding the local match. This resolution is a required element of the application process.

Time Sensitivity (none or explain):	The NCDOT grant application is due November 2, 2018.	
Budget Impact (if applicable):	The Mobility Management application requires a 10% local match which will be supported through local dues. If for some reason, NCDOT funds are not available, a 20% local match is required. Centralina Council of Governments will not accept the grant funds until the local match has been determined. Due to the fact that NCDOT has changed the application process, a detailed budget is not available at this time.

WHEREAS, the funds applied for may be Administrative, Operating, Planning, or Capital funds and will have different percentages of federal, state, and local funds.
WHEREAS, non-Community Transportation applicants may apply for funding for "purchase-of-service" projects under the Capital budget Section 5310 program.

Regional Water Planning – A joint presentation from the Catawba-Wateree Water Management Group (CWWMG) and the Yadkin-Pee Dee Water Management Group (YPDWMG)

## **Background & Basis of Recommendations:**

This session will include presentation content from both water management group chairs, with a focus on framing the context of important water issues within the region, steps being taken for effective water management to support regional growth, and an overview of the important initiatives and projects being led by both groups.

This presentation will also include engagement of the CCOG members to gain feedback on their local water issues, needs, and concerns and to determine how the CWWMG and YPDWMG can help address these key issues on a regional level.

Key Takeaways from the presentation will include:

- We cannot assume our water future is secure since we don't control rainfall.
- Water is a shared resource with a shared management responsibility.
- Regional cooperation is critical across geopolitical and river basin boundaries.
- Regional water suppliers / managers are working hard together to ensure we have action-oriented, science-based plans to meet all our water needs for decades to come.
