Background

Why Am I Here?

- You have been identified as a vital stakeholder for your community's recovery and resilience programs by the city or county Emergency Manager.
- You are a critical component for building a Pre-Disaster Recovery Plan for your community.
- Your participation provides access, at no cost to your community, to resilience and recovery subject matter experts, best practice recovery documents and guidance, and industry leading training on important recovery issues. (limited to the timeframe of the grant funded program)

Why It Matters?

- These workshops will better prepare you and your community for next economic impact.
- These workshop will save your community expenses and taxes for disaster preparedness and recovery operations.
- These workshops will better prepare you and your community to be more competitive for grant opportunities.
- These workshops create a peer-peer working group that is ongoing in the region.

Centralina RRC Program

- October 2019, the **Centralina Economic Development District (EDD)** requested a **U.S. Economic Development Administration (EDA)** awarded on March 5, 2020. (Disaster Coordinator Grant)
- The Centralina EDD and IEM entered a **partnership**; Spring of 2021.
- Regional Resilience Collaborative program (previously, a project) engaged the **NC COG Region-F** in discussions on **Pre-Disaster Recovery** and **Economic Resilience** planning with **local government** and **emergency management** managers.

Regional Recovery Capacity Grant (RRCG)

- Launched from Centralina NC ARPA funds and U.S. EDA CEDS Planning
- Recently awarded by the NC Office of State Budget and Management (OSMB)
- Funds expended July 2022-June 2023; work allowed through June 2024



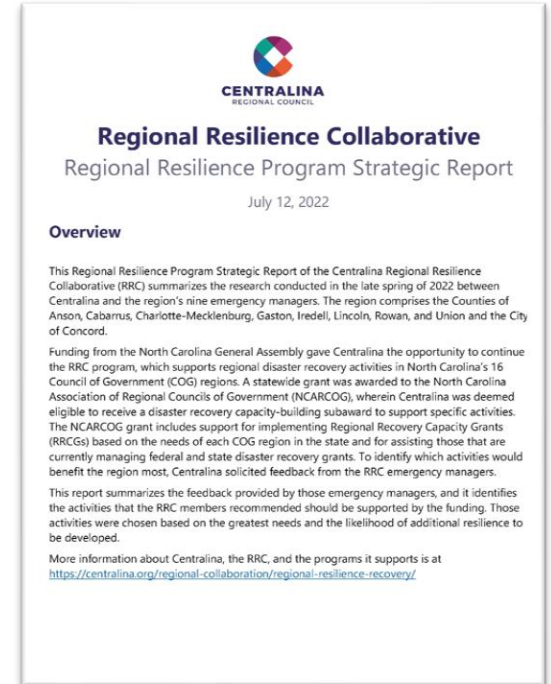
RRC Roundtable Strategy

Task 1

Task 3

Support the **development of tools and data collection** in support of **Grant opportunities**.

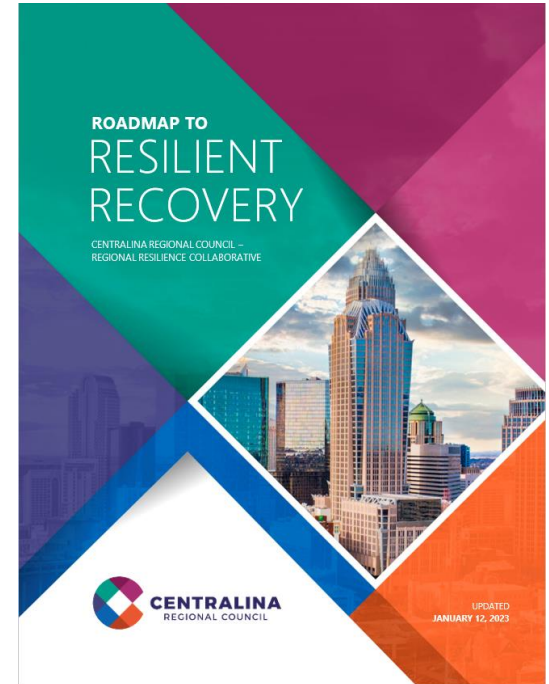

Establishing Targets

- Why create improvement targets?
 - Provides those with responsibility over the recovery program a mechanism for accountability with recovery partners.
 - Creates a metric for recovery program efforts to assess growth.
- Improvement Planning
 - Outlines a high-level approach to accomplishing the target as well as the responsible organization, funding source, and target completion date.
 - Jurisdiction can set priorities and then adjust them during the annual assessment

Overview of Grant Processes

- **Establish Accounts in all State and Federal Grant Systems**
 - SAM.GOV
 - FEMAGO (go.FEMA.gov)
 - State System EMGrants.nc.gov
- **Develop and Submit Application to State**
 - FEMAGO
 - Family of SF-424
 - *A-B for non-construction*
 - C-D for construction
 - Funding Match Letter and Maintenance Agreements
- **Information Collection – Who, What, Why, When and Where**
 - Collect as much relevant technical information as possible such as:
 - Partners
 - Lifelines
 - Building Codes
 - Nature Based Solutions
 - Future Conditions

Overview of Grant Processes

- **Develop and Submit Letter of Intent (LOI) to the State**
 - Maximum of 3 pages
 - Submission Deadline
 - Approval Notification
- **State Submits Application to FEMA**
 - Request for Information (RFIs)
 - Update application and resubmit to state
- **Award Duration (36 mo.)**
- **Grant Management**
 - Reporting, obligation of funding, site surveys, etc.
 - Management Costs
- **Close Out**
 - Reporting, Audits, Lessons Learned

Lessons Learned from BRIC Application

- **Stay ahead** of state and federal deadlines
- Ensure the SOW is **clear and concise**
- **Read** through the NOFO
- **Understand** guidelines
 - Nature Based Solutions
 - Underserved communities
 - Vulnerable and functional need pop
 - Get DFIRMs
- **Gather** all the necessary documentations ASAP
- **Provide** grant information, requirements and education to jurisdiction leadership early and often
- **Identify** the jurisdictions POCs and individuals with access to State and Federal grant systems.

Recovery Planning Development

Pre-Disaster Recovery Plan Technical Assistance Workshop

What is a Pre-Disaster Recovery Plan (PDRP)?



Development of **goals for recovery** that **account for all community sectors** (economy, housing, infrastructure, etc.)



Documentation of recovery **priorities, resources, procedures, implementation steps**, and stakeholder **roles and responsibilities**



Occurs **before disasters** happen to **position jurisdictions to begin the recovery process immediately** after a disaster strikes

Why Is Pre-Disaster Recovery Planning Important?

The Centralina Region is **susceptible to a wide range of hazards** with cascading impacts.

The Centralina Region is **vital to the economic prosperity of many industries** across the United States, and the region is **growing exponentially**.

- Poor coordination and planning in the aftermath of a disaster can result in:
 - Confusion and chaos
 - Financial losses
 - Closure of businesses
 - Loss of residents and visitors
 - Mental and behavioral health issues for the community
 - Political ramifications

Pulse Check

- Emergency Operations Plan
- Hazard Mitigation Plan
- Pre-Disaster Recovery Plan

Why Is Pre-Disaster Recovery Planning Important?

- ✓ **Emergency Operations Plan** addresses **life safety and basic stabilization** after a disaster
- ✓ **Mitigation Plans** identify long-term, broadly supported **strategies for risk reduction** and can assist in the **prioritization of funding** for mitigation actions pre- and post-disaster
- ? **Pre-Disaster Recovery Plans** enable jurisdictions to act quickly to target resources and energy towards holistic recovery

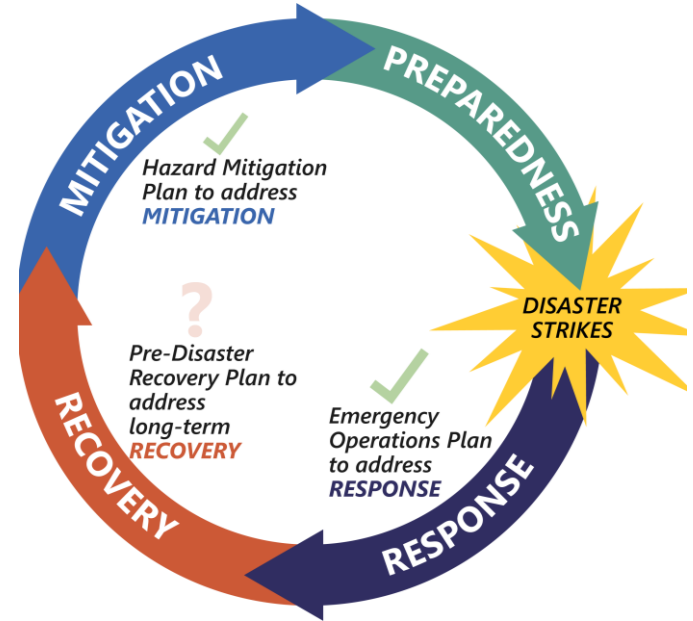

Minimizes financial impacts

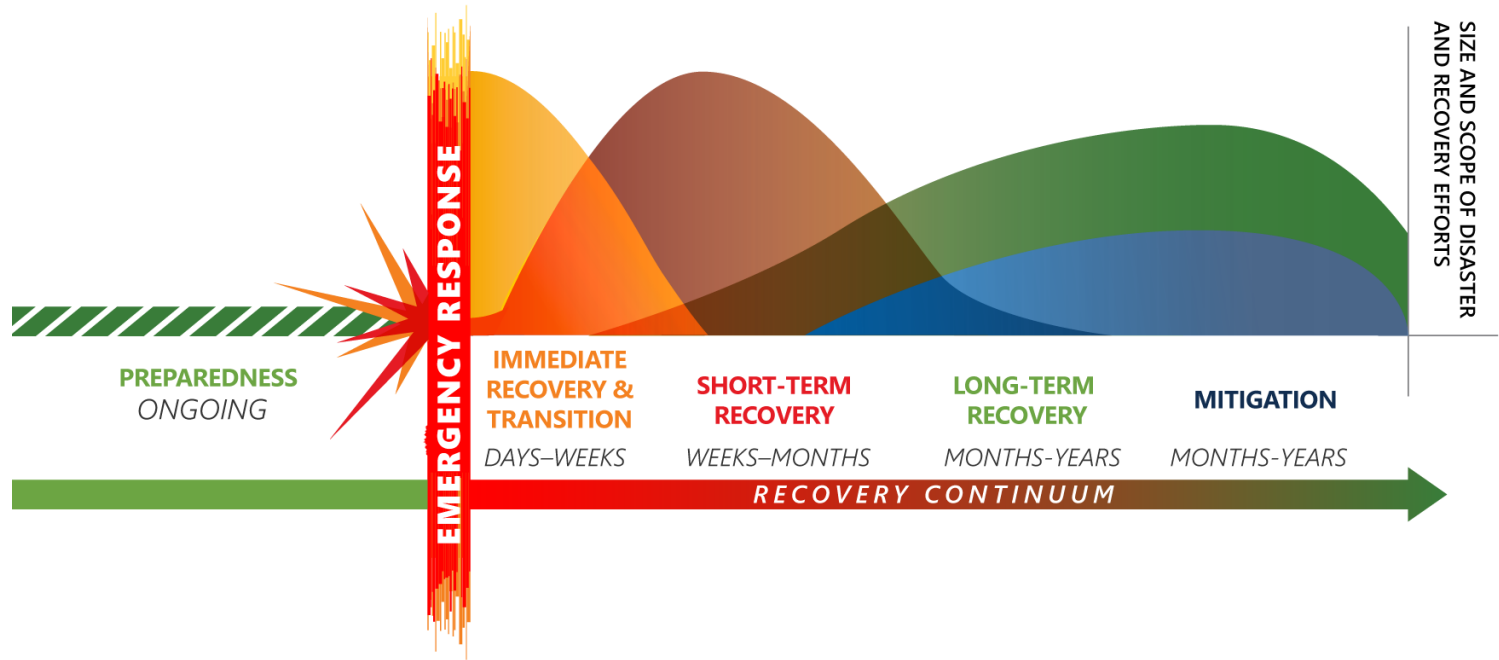
Defines roles and responsibilities

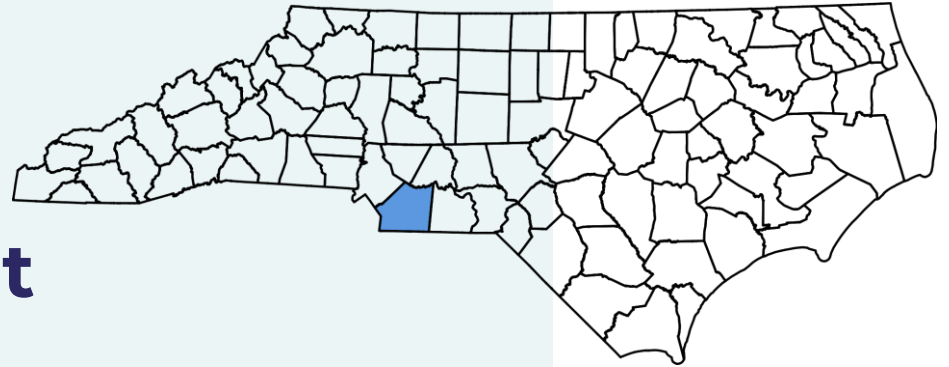
Your Responsibilities
